AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN 2021 CONSENT CALENDAR

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: We have a Consent Calendar for Tabs 3 through 8. So far I have one item removed from the Consent Calendar under Tab 6. It's 26-045. Are there any other -- uh -- items to be removed from the Consent Calendar? Seeing none, I'll entertain a motion.

** SEN. GRAY: Move the Consent Calendar as amended.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Senators -- all right. Senator Gray moves to accept the rest of the Consent Calendar and Senator Rosenwald seconds. Any further discussion? Seeing none, are you ready for the question? All in favor say aye? Opposed no? That motion is adopted.

*** {MOTION ADOPTED}

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: So we'll turn to Tab 6, 26-045, and that is the Department of Health and Human Services. Director Nathan White is here to explain this.

NATHAN WHITE, Chief Financial Officer, Department of Health and Human Services: Good afternoon. Nathan White, Chief Financial Officer with the Department of Health and Human Services. And -- uh -- Chairman Weyler, you just like to have an overview of the item?

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Yes, please.

MR. WHITE: Of course. So what's before you -- uh -- are two actions. And the first action is the acceptance of the Real Health Transformation Grant, year one. And the total amount is 204 million. And those dollars would be received by the Department of Health and Human Services, and then those dollars would be passed through to the GO-NORTH

Office. Um -- and the vast majority of the funds would be passed through. The only funds that would remain within the HHS budget would primarily be the allocated costs and the indirect audit costs that are required.

Um -- we previously did submit an item on behalf of the GO-NORTH Office before the office was formally established. And the second action there, that makes a correction to the original budget. The original plan was for the funds to go directly to the GO-NORTH Office. However, due to some complications at the federal level to avoid any delays, any administrative delays -- um -- the HHS is now acting as the pass-through and receiving those dollars. And that's why you're seeing both the Department of Health and Human Services establishing an AU to receive those dollars, and then the amendment to the GO-NORTH accounting unit as well. So that we're truing up the amount that we actually received, which as a state was a total of \$204 million for year one.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: So is this a multi-year thing or is it all for year one?

MR. WHITE: This request here, this is just for the first grant year. There will be -- it's a five-year award. So this is 204 million. It's \$4 million more than what we applied for. Uh -- we actually received more money than all

the New England surrounding states. We would expect to see potentially \$200 million in subsequent years. I mean, we don't yet know. This grant's a little bit different from other grants that the Department has historically received, in the sense that there are -- uh -- reporting requirements that the State will be subject to. And what the Federal Government will be doing is they'll be monitoring the actual spend. They'll be monitoring the performance, and based on what they're seeing they may adjust future amounts for states. So if we do well, and we spend the money in a timely fashion, and the program is successful, then we actually could be rewarded for that in the future.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: So this -- this kind of means we have to have a building. We have to pay rent. We have to have a lot of staff. And is there time for all this? Is it ready to go right away or has staff been hired?

MR. WHITE: So, the Department began this work and the Commissioner's going to come up here and give an overview.

SEN. GRAY: Didn't take long after you got up from the chair.

LORI WEAVER, Commissioner, Department of Health and Human Services: That was loud. Lori Weaver, HHS

Commissioner. We also have Donnalee Lozeau, who is the Director of GO-NORTH. So when we're talking about staffing, and feel free --

SEN. GRAY: There's a chair over there with a microphone.

COMMISSIONER WEAVER: There's a chair over there with a microphone if you have questions. So GO-NORTH is going to be administering all of the grants, all of the money. The oversight that Nathan is referencing is all done by GO-NORTH. And Donnalee is the Director of that, and then there's staffing within that. So they can't really hire staff until this item passes to accept the money and so we have it in the account. But there is a plan that Donnalee could speak to if she wanted to about -- about staffing. And so a lot of this money will go into procurement, and we will have competitive procurements to release the money for the change that's going to happen wherever it is in the state.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Some of these grants in the past have gone to overtime for State Police and Sheriffs in that area. Is there still some of that or are we replacing them with new staff?

COMMISSIONER WEAVER: The -- so in order to receive the 204 million that we did, we had to submit an

application to CMS that basically said, hey, this is what New Hampshire wants to do, and that was with the input of New Hampshire. That wasn't the Department deciding that. That was all of our partner providers and constituents weighing in. And then CMS approves that plan. So we spend according to what we were approved to spend.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Senator Lang for a question.

SEN. LANG: Thank you, Commissioner, for taking my question. So, again, but we're talking about increasing medical availability, medical service availability in the North Country. And this program and this money is designed to help the North Country to help get physicians, nurses, those kinds of things to provide easier access to quality healthcare in the north.

COMMISSIONER WEAVER: Correct. So those were a lot of things that we heard about transportation, about in-home medical equipment. Um -- all of those big pieces we put into proposals that vendors can bid on to be able to say I want to be able to provide this service, and they would do that with GO-NORTH.

SEN. LANG: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Okay. I guess we got questions from everybody. I'll take Senator Rosenwald, then

Senator Birdsell, then Senator Watters.

CINDY ROSENWALD, State Senator, Senate District

#13: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Thank you for taking my question. So you're -- um -- asking for 121 million for grants for public health systems and relief. Do you -- I don't think we've seen sketched out exactly what program -- what the programmatic elements look like for the first year of GO-NORTH. Is that something you could make available to us so that we know how much is to increase workforce, how much is for -- um -- home equipment or, you know, all the elements of the spending plan that you got the 204 million?

COMMISSIONER WEAVER: Sure. I can't do that right now; but I can do that. What is on our website right now is our plan. So there's the feedback from the community, how we formed that into the application and the plan. What's not in there is the dollar amounts associated because there's some competitive procurements, and we being a smaller state -- um -- weren't posting those at this time. But as those roll out, we'll be able to do that.

GO-NORTH is going to have its own website, which will list all of the procurements that are coming up, and as well as other information that you're asking for. I just can't do that right at this time.

SEN. ROSENWALD: Got it. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Senator Birdsell for a question.

REGINA BIRDSELL, State Senator, Senate District #19: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Thank you for taking my question. Um -- I know that there's a hiring freeze in the state. Is this GO-NORTH -- um -- hiring, is that going to be included in that or is this a separate entity?

COMMISSIONER WEAVER: So GO-NORTH was established with an Executive Order by the Governor's Office. So it does allow hiring for those positions under the Governor Office under Donnalee.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Senator Watters for a question.

DAVID WATTERS, State Senator, Senate District #04: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Thank you. So in terms of the future grant awards -- um -- I see on Page 2 -- um -- that period two was exactly received September 2026. So, is that potentially the next 200 million or how does that get phased?

MR. WHITE: Yes. So Senator Watters is referring to the chart there that he identified on Page 2 of 5. What you'll see there is you'll see the -- there's -- there's five bars. And the first bar you'll see is spending for budget

period one.

SEN. WATTERS: Yep.

MR. WHITE: And this 204 million is part of that budget period one. So then with the next federal fiscal year we'll -- and for budget period one we only have about 18 months to spend it. And with subsequent years we'll -- we'll -- we'll have a full 24 months to spend those dollars. But -- um -- the -- the -- the plan that has been submitted and approved, it -- it accounts for that, so that spending isn't necessarily linear. So there's a ramp-up period of time to make sure that -- that the State is successful.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Further question?

SEN. WATTERS: Thank you. So what I'm trying to kind of understand is over the period of the GO-NORTH Program, how many -- at what moments will there be additional funding and how much? And then related to that question is, is it basically will those grants sustain kind of what you have or they allow expansions?

MR. WHITE: Sure. So I'll answer the first question, then I'll hand it over the sustainability question to the Commissioner. Um -- so we would expect to receive those grant awards sometime before the federal fiscal year. So this accept and spend is just for the first one. We would expect

that the Governor's -- the Governor's Office GO-NORTH would and -- and HHS, we would be coming back in the future, probably in the late summer, potentially August, to accept the subsequent award or potentially even September time frame. That's probably when we would know it. And, again, because this grant's a little bit more dynamic than most that we work with where the Feds are actively looking at performance and spending, you know, we won't necessarily know if it's going to be 204 or two oh or 200 or 198 or whatever it might be until we near that point. I think that's just one of the unknowns. Sometimes we get these five-year grants, we have pretty strong certainty of what that figure would look like. But in this case, it's just a little different, and that's why timeliness is so important -- uh -- in accepting these funds and getting the contracts going. I'll hand the sustainability question over to the Commissioner.

COMMISSIONER WEAVER: Thank you. I want to make sure I understand the question. Would you be able to repeat it?

SEN. WATTERS: Yes. So if we're -- let's say we get around \$200 million each phase of this. Is that to sustain the basic plan in place or would you be able to expand or shift to other services over that period, shift to other services?

COMMISSIONER WEAVER: So we would award contracts based on deliverables that were approved, right? And then I think we would be evaluated on how well we deliver or don't. And GO-NORTH would do that with CMS. Um -- and if there needed to be course correcting and shifting, I think that would be the negotiation that we would do with CMS to be able to say. But in terms of sustainability in general, I would say that the money is to create the transformative change, and then whatever change you make has to then be sustainable -- sustainable.

So we make these investments, but the investment is to make it happen, not for it to keep going in the future. And so -- so, for an example -- um -- we are looking at, you know, having certified behavioral health clinics, right? So that the goal there is to be able to have services that provide -- meet all of the needs of whoever the recipient is. So that's mental health and primary care health. Um -- it allows the Community Mental Health Centers to have an alternative payment models which ultimately pay them at a higher rate than what they're getting now. So the idea would be that would offset some of the uncompensated care, and that they would be able to sort of work with that and -- and that's the pickle that we've been in with, you know, the high level of

uncompensated care. So that's the idea of sustainability is that we're making changes in that infrastructure and that model and that financial model to be able to sustain in the future. So that's one example, but there's a bunch of different other ways, too.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: How many new staff?

COMMISSIONER WEAVER: In GO-NORTH -- um -- about 20. I heard a voice from the back say about 20.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Twenty? Okay. Any further questions from Committee?

SEN. LANG: Move to approve, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Representative Birdsell (sic) moves the item and is seconded by Senator Birdsell. There any

further discussion? Seeing none, all in favor say aye?
 Opposed no? That item is adopted.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Moving on to Tab 11, two items
 and these have been adjusted. Um --

 -- Senator Lang moves to approve both items, 028 and 029. Any
 questions on these items? I guess everybody's gotten the
 revised and reduced. What's that?

KEITH ERF, State Representative, Hillsborough
 County, District #28: Who seconded?

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: I think that was seconded by
 Senator Birdsell again. Oh, no, Senator Rosenwald. All right.
 So, FIS 26-028 and FIS 26-029 are both in this motion for
 approval. Further discussion? Seeing none, all in favor of
 this two items being approved say aye? Opposed no. Those
 items are adopted.

(12) Chapter 140, Laws of 2025, Agency Footnote:

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Moving on to Tab 12, item number 26-034, Department of Corrections has been withdrawn.

SEN. GRAY: I would like to comment, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Certainly.

SEN. GRAY: We are looking very closely at these things. And if you come in and ask for new money, it's going to get looked at very, very closely. Okay. And if you come in and ask for new money on overtime, and you haven't told us how you are spending the money that would have been spent on straight time to get to that overtime, then you're going to get a question from us, at least. So, again, scrutiny. The budget is tight. The budget is very, very tight. So especially if it's new money, we're going to be looking hard at it.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Yes. I'm glad you make that point because any new money is likely to have to come out of the Rainy Day Fund, and it's certain limits to how much we can take out of that, so.

SEN. LANG: Mr. Chair, question. So for -- for you. So, again, on this item, I know we asked -- um -- a question of the agency, and I'm wondering whether we'll still get a response considering {Inaudible}, and the question was Senator Gray's point. If you have so much overtime because you don't have enough staff, there should be some money left over

in your full-time line. And we wanted to know what the budget lines, what those balances look like, and we haven't heard from that. So I'm just wondering whether we are going to get an answer to that or we're going to wait till this comes back?

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Senator Gray.

SEN. GRAY: Chair, let me answer that. They need to come in and true up the accounts no matter what. Okay. So they overspent the overline -- overtime line. So they need to come back and at least adjust that in some way. Whether that's new money or transferring money out, and that's all going to come back through us as long as it goes -- it's within the limits. And --

MICHAEL KANE, Legislative Budget Assistant, Office of Legislative Budget Assistant: We will also, Mr. Chair, we'll also reach out to Department of Corrections. We did pose questions relative to the, you know, the vacancy rate, the available funds, and the other class lines, and we'll make sure the Committee gets those answers even prior, you know, prior to the next item. We'll provide that.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Thank you, Mr. Kane. Further discussion on that item that has been removed? There's no vote called for.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Moving on to Informational Items. Anything that the Committee wishes to have questions answered on any Informational Items? Nobody has any questions. All right. I guess we are ready then to move on to the audits. We have a few of those before us.

Audits:

SEN. GRAY: {Inaudible}. There is things I want, you know.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Some of those we work on outside of us.

CHRISTINE YOUNG, Director, Audit Division, Office of Legislative Budget Assistant: Okay. Good afternoon, Mr. Chairman, and Committee Members. For the record, I'm Christine Young, the Director of Audits for the LBA. We're here to present the annual reports for the College Savings Plans.

As you know, our office retains the services of PricewaterhouseCoopers to perform these audits. And with us from PwC is Sean Kay, the partner, and Monica Mezzapelle, our State Treasurer and the Trustee of the Plans. We'll also be available for questions or comments. And, with that, I'll turn it over to Sean for the presentation.

SEAN KAY, Partner, PricewaterhouseCoopers:

Thank you. Thank you, Christine. Appreciate the chance to be here to present to you. I'll keep our -- my remarks fairly summary level.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: The first one?

MR. KAY: Yes, those are the materials there.

Thank you.

And, so, if you're looking to follow along, Page 5 is where I'll -- I'll focus my commentary.

So in scope for the audits while we're moving through that are the Unique College Investing Plan and the Fidelity Advisory 529 Plan, those are the structures for the State of New Hampshire with 70 underlying -- 70 plus underlying structures. The year end for those entities is September 30th.

Um -- in 2025, we presented to the Treasurer and her team our plan. We were able to execute on that plan, and then -- uh -- in December -- on December 12th, 2025, I issued a clean opinion for each of the structures given the -- uh -- very good outcomes that we encountered during the course of our audit examination.

In our examination, we tested 100% of the assets. We validated pricing. We validated the existence of those assets. We're also able to undertake a number of -- um

-- focus judgments related to the fees the State of New Hampshire collects. Um -- and again, the results for all of those examinations, for all those inspection items were very clean. We had no material weaknesses. There were no audit adjustments. Nor were there any items that were unadjusted and need of reporting to this group.

So -- uh -- obviously, the control environment that we encountered at Fidelity, who is the sponsor for those structures, was also just clean as in -- as in historical periods as well.

The rest of our materials are fairly routine. And so given that they are ex -- they're not extraordinary, I'll take them as read, if that's okay with the Committee. Uh -- but I'm happy to answer any questions the Committee may have on those audits of those two structures.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Questions from Committee Members? Okay. And the Treasurer Mezzapelle and I are familiar with a lot of these things because we look at them every quarter from Fidelity.

MONICA MEZZAPELLE, State Treasurer, Department of Treasury: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair, Members of the Committee. For the record, State Treasurer, Monica Mezzapelle. I just want to take the opportunity to thank -- um -- uh -- Mr.

Sean Kay and his staff, and also Director Young, for the work that they do on these audits. I mean, those are excellent, clean audits. Always happy to these results. And, also -- um -- happy to see that our program manager continues to do an excellent job with not only with the operations, and also managing the plan. So I just wanted to take the moment to -- to thank him for all their work. It's always a pleasure to work with them. It is an easy part of my job. So I'm always very thankful for that.

Um -- and regarding the plans -- um -- members of the Advisory Committee know -- um -- the plans are doing really well. We continue to grow. The plans are about right now over \$32 billion in assets under management. As you all know, we -- we get a portion of that revenue that we use for scholarship programs. We did really well. We spent most of the money last or we spent all of the money in scholarship programs last year. We will -- the plan is to continue to do that and provide scholarships for low-income students. So, again, always happy to talk about this program. The highlight of all of our jobs, I believe. So I'd be happy to answer any questions.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: How much revenue are we getting this year from the program?

MS. MEZZAPELLE: We anticipate about \$20 million in revenue.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Twenty million.

MS. MEZZAPELLE: And -- and -- and, again, there's a portion that goes to the General Fund, but the rest will come to the Trust and that the plan is it will be used for scholarship programs.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Very good. Committee Members have any questions? I go to quarterly meetings, and I'm impressed with how thorough our Treasurer is and keeps a good handle on this, and that's why it's as successful as it is. Thank you very much.

MS. MEZZAPELLE: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Anything further? I believe, Mr. Kane, we've already had a motion or do we need --

MR. KANE: These have already been released.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: We've already made the motion to place them on file and release in the usual manner. All right. Any further questions on any of these audits? Seeing none, we'll go to other business. Thank you very much. Appreciate all the good work, and I'm glad everything's working out. All right, Mr. Kane, what other business would you like us to work on?

(15) Date of Next Meeting and Adjournment

MR. KANE: A date of the next meeting. So the -- you could do March 20th, if -- if it works for all your schedules or any other day.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: So March 20. I don't have anything that far ahead. Spring Equinox. Okay. Uh -- anybody have any restrictions as to when we should start? Is there any preferred time?

SEN. GRAY: We were doing the budget. I don't know if that's where we want to go.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Well, at this point we can make adjustments to that, because --

MAUREEN MOONEY, State Representative, Hillsborough County, District #12: Mr. Chairman, I would just bring up that I wasn't at the Health and Human Services Oversight Committee this morning.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: They meet that same Friday?

REP. MOONEY: It's my understanding they mentioned the Friday after, so we may be clear. Is that true those that were in attendance?

SEN. GRAY: 27th is when they're planning on meeting.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Good. So that won't interfere

with it. Thank you.

REP. MOONEY: Okay.

SEN. LANG: I'm not sure which members are on JLCAR, but we meet at 9 that morning.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: JLCAR meets at nine the same day.

SEN. LANG: The same day.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: So, how long do you usually go? It's fairly lengthy.

SEN. LANG: {Inaudible}. If you did 11, it wouldn't -- it wouldn't interfere, I don't believe.

SEN. GRAY: That's one of the reasons we went to 11.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Would you like to have that meeting start at 11? Anybody? Any objections over here? Friday the 20th of March, 11 o'clock. Probably in this same room. I'm amazed at -- uh -- the items we had that were non-controversial.

SEN. GRAY: I -- I think everybody's just trying to get home before the snow.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: We've got another meeting scheduled for House Finance. So, we can start early, but wish -- see how many people are available. All right. I think if

we look out in the hall, we may be able to start an early meeting. We might have a lot of the members here now.

SEN. GRAY: Depends on when you were announced for.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: Announced for 2:30.

SEN. GRAY: Sorry about that.

CHAIRMAN WEYLER: I thought we'd go longer, but this is kind of a record day. Unbelievable. Thank you all for your --
